#### Horace Mann recognized for sustainability efforts

Horace Mann has received the Outstanding Leadership in Sustainability Gold Level award for its sustainability efforts at its headquarters in Springfield, III.

Horace Mann achieved Gold Level status due to its sustainable practices in the areas of energy efficiency, waste reduction, water conservation, green products/services, vehicle emissions, renewable energy and biodiversity. Horace Mann has reduced its Scope 1 and Scope 2 carbon emissions by more than one-third in two years. The company has pledged to cut carbon emissions in half by 2030 and achieve net-zero carbon emissions by 2050.


"Horace Mann is a company with a clear understanding of the major impact of climate change on the well-being of our planet," said Harv Koplo, treasurer of the Sustainable Springfield nonprofit. "This company has replaced all of the windows with double-paned insulated glass, installed more water efficient fixtures throughout its headquarters, incorporated native plants into its landscaping to attract butterflies and pollinators, and included electric charging stations in its employee parking lot."

## 'Cool new desks' help classroom move forward after hurricane

September 8, 2022



After Hurricane Ida tore through Louisiana last year, educators were faced not only with damage to their homes, but to their classrooms as well.

At South Larose Elementary School in in Lafourche Parish, classroom materials were destroyed and desks severely damaged. Bless Your Heart, a local nonprofit, wanted to help classrooms return to normal – or even get an upgrade.


"We are striving to return their learning experience to the level they deserve," said board member Luke Newman.

With the help of the Horace Mann Educators Foundation, Bless Your Heart purchased 32 dry-erase tabletop stations for Larose Elementary. Students can use the desks to work through math problems or brainstorm ideas, and can put the stations together for larger projects.

"Using the collaborative desk allows students to do something they have always been fussed for --writing on a desk!" said Principal Dana Gros. "Having these cool, new desks brought more joy than I can even express in words."

## Springfield community comes together to help remote learners, working families

Springfield (III.) Public Schools went fully remote for most of the first two years of the COVID-19 pandemic. This created problems for working families with young school-age children. With a grant from Horace Mann Educators Corporation and Federal Home Loan Bank of Chicago, four community organizations (Central Illinois Boys and Girls Clubs, Compass for Kids, The Matthew Project and the Springfield Urban League) were able to expand their remote learning support to offer services to more than 500 students during the height of the pandemic.

#### HMEF supports Madison, Wis., teachers

Every year, teachers spend hundreds of dollars of their own money to buy school supplies for their classrooms. In Madison, Wis., the average is about \$500 annually, according to the Madison Public Schools Foundation (MPSF).

To help alleviate this financial burden on educators, MPSF created the <u>Teacher Support Network</u>, which provides each school in the Madison Metropolitan School District with a need-based budget, access to an online shopping portal, and fast delivery of high-quality supplies direct to schools from a local vendor. The Network's online shopping system went live in fall 2021, providing learning materials as varied as science kits, mental health resources, headphones and whiteboards to classrooms in need.

To celebrate Horace Mann becoming a part of the <u>Madison community</u>, the Horace Mann Educators Foundation contributed \$20,000 to help replenish the Teacher Support Network budget for 2022.

"Through our Teacher Support Network, every school in the district has access to hundreds of traditional school and classroom supplies and we continue to add to the offerings, based on teacher and school feedback," said Foundation President Melinda Heinritz. "This meaningful gift will enable us to replenish the school budgets while also expanding our offerings to athletic and recess equipment, art supplies, and individually-packaged snacks."

## Compass for Kids expands after-school program with Horace Mann grant

April 20, 2021

Compass for Kids, a nonprofit providing resources to support at-risk children in Springfield Public Schools, is crediting a grant from Horace Mann and First Home Loan Bank of Chicago (FHLB) with helping them lessen learning loss during the pandemic.

Executive Director Molly Berendt says the \$17,500 grant the organization received from Horace Mann and FHLB in fall 2020 helped them hire an Education Director and ensure their traditional after-school program, Club Compass, could transition to a virtual environment. This included purchasing additional Zoom licenses, web programs and SurveyMonkey, as well as books for each student to participate in a book club.

"The Horace Mann grant was critical to our ability to be adaptive, continually improving our Virtual Club Compass as the needs changed," said Berendt. "It has allowed us to expand and enhance our program, and really was monumental in making sure this year was as successful as possible in supporting students in many different ways."

Berendt said Virtual Club Compass focuses on social and emotional learning, something students weren't getting as much of during remote learning at school. At first, Club Compass made Thursday's book club optional, but they found kids were excited to join both.

"We were very worried that kids in school for five hours a day of remote learning wouldn't want to participate in a virtual program in their afternoons or evenings," said Berendt. "But our participation level, our attendance and engagement has been so much higher than we initially thought. It is a testament to the kids' desire for connection."

She said kids who were shy at the beginning of the school year and wouldn't look at the camera, raise their hand or answer questions are now doing all those things.

"We see them showing up on Tuesdays and Thursdays with a smile. They want to see their peers, they want to connect with the staff and our volunteers," she added. "What we've seen over the course of the school year is the kids feel like they have an additional place besides school where they do belong and have people that care about them. We've seen them grow and open up."

#### Horace Mann Helps 'Keep Kids Learning' at Home

As thousands of teachers quickly switched to remote learning due to COVID-19, there was little time to prepare students for the change. Sixty-eight percent of educators told DonorsChoose their students lacked the resources they needed to learn from home.

To help educators in its communities provide remote learning resources, Horace Mann donated \$100,000 to the DonorsChoose Keep Kids Learning campaign. The donation helped more than 100 educators in central Illinois, the Dallas-Fort Worth area and the North Carolina Triangle provide learning supplies for students at home.

Springfield pre-K educator Janette Smith used the funds to create bags adorned with "I Miss You" stickers for her students with books, watercolors, Play-Doh, markers, flash cards and games.

"I was able to say, use your watercolors and paint me a picture, use your dry erase board and write your name," she said. "And I will tell you, those kids got real creative with the stuff that I was able to give them."

## Horace Mann to distribute \$100,000 to address Springfield educational equity gaps exacerbated by pandemic

October 1, 2020



Horace Mann, in partnership with the Federal Home Loan Bank of Chicago, will provide more than \$100,000 to four Springfield organizations focused on closing student opportunity gaps exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The grants allow the organizations to assist nearly 500 additional low-to-moderate income families with targeted educational support, like providing safe remote learning spaces with reliable Internet access, additional learning opportunities for students falling behind, and basic needs like food and housing assistance for families.

One of the most pressing needs is safe, supervised remote learning sites for children with working parents, which several of the organizations will expand under the grants. Other programs include social and emotional learning programs and enrichment activities for at-risk students, assistance with basic needs for families, and support for parents taking a more active role in their child's learning.

Horace Mann's \$45,000 community donation was supported by an additional \$60,000 from FHLBank Chicago's Targeted Impact Fund. The <u>Boys and Girls Clubs of Central Illinois</u> and the <u>Springfield Urban League</u> will each receive \$35,000, while <u>Compass for Kids</u> and <u>The Matthew Project</u> will each receive \$17,500.

### Horace Mann pilots wildfire certification program in California

April 1, 2020



The 2018 Camp Fire shocked California residents, first responders and insurance companies alike. Fueled by hot, dry gusts of wind, the fire burned 80 acres a minute at one point.

Once the fire was out, claims were settled and the rebuilding began, Horace Mann instituted a pilot "wildfire certification program" in the heavily wooded Paradise and Chico areas. An experienced Horace Mann loss control specialist visits insured homes — at no cost to the customer — to identify easily rectified risks, such as removing flammable pine needles, vegetation and firewood from the perimeter or roof of the home, using fire-resistant building materials on the roof and exterior walls, and installing vent screens to keep flying embers from entering the house.

"We can be proud that as a company, we're doing everything in our power to prevent a house from burning down — and give people more time to get out safely," said Matt Rubin, Horace Mann assistant vice president.
