The NEA Foundation has announced the five winners of the 2024 Horace Mann Awards for Teaching Excellence, one of public education's top honors.

They are:

- Seth Brady, a social studies educator at Naperville Central High School in Naperville, III., nominated by the Illinois Education Association.
- Harlee Harvey, a K-8 educator at Tikigaq School in Point Hope, Alaska, nominated by NEA-Alaska.
- Carol Pierobon Hofer, an English as a New Language educator at Fox Hill Elementary School in Indianapolis, Ind., nominated by the Indiana State Teachers Association.
- Kimberly Johnson, an interventionist and resource educator at Auburn Junior High School in Auburn, Ala., nominated by the Alabama Education Association.
- Louise Smith, a band director at Gautier Middle School, Miss., nominated by the Mississippi Association of Educators.

An expert panel evaluates and selects awardees based on their exceptional skill in the classroom, attention to equity and diversity, engagement of families and communities, commitment to ongoing professional development, and advocacy for the profession. They will be honored at The NEA Foundation's Salute to Excellence in Education celebration next year.

"The Horace Mann Awards for Teaching Excellence winners exemplify what it means to be dedicated to your craft, and we are inspired by the passion of these individuals," said Marita Zuraitis, president of the Horace Mann Educators Foundation board of directors.

Teacher Support Network addresses educators' out-of-pocket spending


Public school teachers in Madison, Wisc., spend an average of \$750 of their own money each year on classroom supplies and necessities for their students.

"Teachers are under an incredible amount of pressure to support the whole child," said Laurie Stensland of the Madison Public Schools Foundation. "If their kids need something, they're going to get it – that's the beauty of teachers."

To help alleviate this financial burden on educators and support students in need, the Foundation created the <u>Teacher Support Network</u>, which provides each school in the Madison Metropolitan School District with a need-based budget, access to an online shopping portal, and fast delivery of high-quality supplies direct to schools from a local vendor. This "right on time" model increases donation efficiency by providing for very specific needs when they are needed, as opposed to traditional school supply drives that are more broad-based.

The Horace Mann Educators Foundation has contributed \$20,000 to the Teacher Support Network for each of the past two years to support educators and students across the district.

"It's such a relief for teachers ... to say you don't have to reach into your pocket, we've got it," said school social worker Betsy Scholz. "I think that's just very respectful of teachers as professionals."



Horace Mann formalizes DEI strategy statement

As dean of students and restorative justice facilitator at Wyandotte High School in Kansas, Natalie Johnson-Berry is in a unique position to work with and advocate for students who feel they aren't being seen.

One community-building activity has students share positive statements about themselves and have others repeat those statements back to them.

"The goal is to get people to recognize their power," Johnson-Berry said. "I believe if you put things out there, you're going to start to internalize that. Part two of that is having the person affirm you. It's about seeing each other as fellow humans."

This month, Johnson-Berry was awarded the NEA Foundation Member Benefits Award, one of the nation's top honors for public educators. She and four other educators were honored with Horace Mann Awards for Teaching Excellence at the NEA Foundation's Salute to Education Gala. The awards are sponsored by the Horace Mann Educators Foundation, which aims to recognize the dedication of the nation's educators to helping every student reach their full potential.

Johnson-Berry said she was inspired to become an educator by teachers who helped her as a bullied high school student.

"Those teachers, they changed something in me, they made me believe that I could be someone," she said. "That's what led me to fight for the rights of other students who feel like they're not seen, like me. I am pursuing a doctorate degree and it's because education is vital. It can free you."

Social-emotional learning curriculum helps students adjust

The 22 first graders in Ashley Barham's classroom aren't used to being so close to other students. In fact, they aren't used to being around other students at all.

With much of their kindergarten and first-grade years confined to remote learning due to the COVID-19 pandemic, there were gaps in students' social-emotional learning, like emotion management and decision-making, compared to previous classes.

"Learning on Zoom did not prepare them for what regular school, regular friendships and learning looks like," said Barham, a teacher at Butler Elementary School in Springfield, III.

When students returned to classrooms full-time, all elementary and middle school teachers in Springfield Public Schools had access to the Second Step social-emotional digital learning curriculum, funded by the Horace Mann Educators Foundation. The program has grade-specific lessons and gives teachers and students a shared vocabulary to discuss emotions, conflict and cooperation.

"I'm optimistic," Barham said. "Every day we practice these skills, and hold them accountable to be successful, respectful and responsible humans."

'We Read Together' program expands

The choice for Richardson Independent School District students was a tough one.

A colorful vending machine showcased their options: Books about animals, families, zombies — and more than one novel centered on normal kids with secret superpowers.

As part of the <u>Richardson ISD Foundation</u>'s "We Read Together" program, students each got to pick a book of their own to take home.

"Every kid's eyes lit up," said Horace Mann Vice President Thomas Kammerer, who helped students make their decisions.

The program at the Dallas-area district aims to address early literacy learning gaps before children reach third grade. It provides students with books, literacy games and one-on-one mentors. A recent contribution from the Horace Mann Educators Foundation will fund these resources for 300 more students in 12 elementary schools.

"Literacy is the gate to all things," said Carrie Saunders, Richardson ISD director of community engagement. "Every single content area, you use the skill of reading. So it's vital that we come in and make the impact early, so they can be successful for years to come."
